Business

High School Science

With the 2024/25 school year now complete, here is a summary of what students completed during the 4th quarter in Mr. Dahl's high school science classes:

Biology Sophomore biology students began the quarter by learning about the classification and the anatomy of various vertebrate and invertebrate animals. After they learned about lab tools and safety, the students completed six dissections to connect what we learned about in class to the hands-on lab activities. Once our animal units were complete, biology classes finished the semester discussing population biology and ecology principles while completing some outdoor activities in our school forest and at Minnow Ponds.

<u>Body</u>, <u>Structure & Function (BSF)</u>: This is a junior/senior level dual credit anatomy and physiology class offered through NTC. The units covered this quarter were: The muscular system, nervous system, the special senses, and the blood/cardiovascular system. Various activities and labs that students have completed were brain and heart dissections, a sense



of taste lab, and a simulated blood type lab. Many of the students ended up earning college credits to prepare themselves for their future college and career journeys.







Middle School Science Newsletter

7th Grade:

Our 7th-grade scientists have wrapped up an exciting year in physical science! We recently finished our unit on magnetism and electricity, where students explored magnets, static electricity, and even built simple electromagnets during hands-on labs. Following that, we dove into the electromagnetic spectrum, studying how technology has evolved to use different types of waves for communication and discovery. To close out the year, we reviewed and had a test on all the major concepts we've learned over this school year—from energy and the structure of matter to chemical processes, forces, electricity, and information transfer through waves. It's been a year full of experiments, critical thinking,



and great discussions. Next year, students will shift their focus to life science, where we'll explore living systems, ecosystems, genetics, and more!

6th Grade:

Our 6th-grade students ended the year with a deep dive into Earth's history, learning about geologic time from the Precambrian eon to the present Holocene epoch. We explored different geologic, weather, and climate hazards, understanding how these natural events have shaped our planet. To wrap up the year, students studied natural resources and climate change, examining the important connection between the two. As a final project, students chose a natural resource, created a survey for their peers, and conducted research on its uses, environmental impacts, and ties to climate change. They presented their findings in creative and informative presentations. Next year's focus will be space science and physical science — we're looking forward to exploring the universe and the physical forces that shape our world.

Social Studies

This quarter has been a fantastic culmination of learning experiences. In 8th Grade, students delved into the Renaissance and the Protestant Reformation, bridging the gap into the "Modern age" of world history. In our Global Issues class, students explored critical challenges facing our world today, fostering an awareness of global responsibilities. Meanwhile, the Contemporary U.S. History class wrapped up with an in-depth analysis of significant U.S. conflicts, discussing their causes, consequences, and lasting impacts on both national and global scales. In Comparative Government, our students concluded the semester focusing on Global Citizenship, examining the role of the United Nations, Human Rights, and the U.S. position in Foreign Affairs.

Our History Through Media class engaged with the Feminist movement in the U.S. through films like 9 to 5 and Barbie, and explored the Black Lives Matter movement using The Hate U Give and Just Mercy. Students closely analyzed primary and secondary sources related to these films. Finally, our Introduction to Diversity class wrapped up with a global perspective by comparing multiethnic societies in South Africa, Canada, Brazil, and the United States.

ELA

Quarter 4 Summaries for ELA 6 & 7

During the fourth quarter, 6th-grade ELA students completed their study of African American females who had significant contributions that were overlooked in the Space Race. Students looked at historical timelines and documents as part of their Space Race background knowledge expansion. They analyzed the text for central ideas, the author's point of view, and read the book <u>Hidden Figures</u> by Margot Lee Shetterly. They co-constructed an essay about one of the hidden figures and another overlooked individual in space exploration and knowledge. The performance task to end the unit was to create a children's book on the focus figure as a team.

During the third quarter, 7th-grade ELA students with Mrs. Guldan completed their study of plastic pollution and focused on potential solutions at different stages of the plastic life cycle. Students explored the plastic pollution problem in our ocean by viewing the 2016 documentary A Plastic Ocean directed by Craig Leeson and reading Trash Vortex: How Plastic Pollution Is Choking the World's Oceans by Danielle Smith-Llea. Addressing the pollution problem, students studied Boyan Slat of The Ocean Cleanup and the progress being made to clean up the Great Pacific Garbage Patch. At the beginning of the life cycle, students explored new biodegradable materials and other countries' approaches to limiting plastic products. Students engaged in a debate and co-created an argumentative essay, taking a stance on the most effective intervention point to reduce plastic pollution. Throughout the unit, students have learned about the power of each individual and the impact we have on our environment.

English 9

Within the final quarter of the year, learners in English 9 practiced their understanding of figurative language within the reading of *The Tragedy of Romeo and Juliet*. They also had the opportunity to act out a scene from the play. In addition, they demonstrated mastery of new vocabulary, the usage of commas, and learned how to use semicolons and colons correctly. This group wrapped up the year with a creative book flyer and photo project highlighting symbolism within their independent novel.

English 12

During their final quarter of high school English, students in English 12 analyzed many facets of heroes in literature, from comic books to the stories of *Beowulf*, and Louis Zamperini in the story of *Unbroken*. Throughout the quarter, they applied critical thinking skills with media literacy practice and applied their knowledge by writing fake news articles. This unit evoked many chuckles or giggles as learners read satire and created their outrageous articles. Seniors finished the year writing thank you letters to people who had been supportive of them over the past 17 (or so) years.

To cap things off, students completed a creative and rigorous book report. They got to choose their own novel, respond to thoughtful literary questions, and present their book in a format of their choice—everything from posters and slideshows to videos and



performances. It's been a great finish to an even greater year, and I'm proud of all their hard work as they move on to high school!

NONDISCRIMINATION

It is the policy of the Edgar School District that no person may be denied admission to any public school in this district or be denied participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be discriminated against in any curricular, Career and Technical/Education, extracurricular, pupil service, recreational, or other program or activity because of the person's sex, race, religion, national origin, ancestry, creed, pregnancy, marital or parental status, sexual orientation, or physical, mental, emotional, or learning disability or handicap as required by s. 118.13, Wis. Stats. This policy also prohibits discrimination under related federal statutes, including Title IX of the Educational Amendments of 1972 (sex), Title II, Title VI and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (race and national origin), Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (handicap), and the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. This policy also prohibits harassment.

The district encourages informal resolution of complaints under this policy. A formal complaint resolution procedure is available, however, to address allegations of violations of the policy in the Edgar School District. For complaint procedures see Board Policies 1422, 2260, 2421, 3122, 4122, and 5517.

Stats., of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex, or inquiries related to Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of handicap, should be directed to:
