After the military, he relocated to Milwaukee where he worked in several aviation capacities - as an aircraft mechanic and pilot for Midwest Airways, certified FAA aircraft inspector, serving as the team pilot for the Milwaukee Bucks in their early years, and as chief pilot for Kearney & Trecker Corporation until his retirement. While in Milwaukee he met and married his life-long spouse Patricia and they settled in Oak Creek, Wisconsin.

During this time, he actively served in the Milwaukee Civil Air Patrol for over 40 years, receiving the rank of Major. He served as their flight instructor and oversaw aircraft maintenance operations. Recently, he was duly recognized for his successes in aviation by receiving two Federal Aviation Administration awards - the Charles Taylor Master Mechanic Award in 2011 and the FAA Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award in 2013, specifically for maintaining and promoting aircraft safety and operations for over 50 years.
