

The fourth grade learners are off to a great start in the classroom. They are learning more about themselves as a learner. Being responsible, being respectful, being safe and being a friend are things that are at the core of our "Wildcat Way" here at Edgar Elementary School. We have looked at our strength in each of these areas and we have looked at where we need to grow in these areas. Each learner set a goal for themselves as they reflected upon where they would like to develop greater skills to be successful in school and in life. We began the academic journey with a lesson about how we all learn differently and finding that "good fit" learning style is as important as finding a "good fit" shoe for the occasion that it's needed for. Embracing the idea of a "good fit", learners were introduced to their very first UDL (Universal Design for Learners) Choice Board in Reading. After receiving the core instruction learners had a choice as to how they want to continue to learn the concepts and how they want to demonstrate their understanding of the concepts taught. Learners were very excited to take ownership in their learning path and having choices was at the top of the list when asking them how they felt about the UDL Choice Board. "I really liked the vocabulary activity with the hashtags, said Macy". Mia added to that by saying, "I like to draw the word," and Jaylin also stated, "in drawing the words, it helps me to remember the word."

Many of our classmates liked the read to self time choice and time to take AR tests. Mackenzie said, "my favorite was the choice of writing cursive in my writing packet because I really like to write." The class agreed having choices of the types of activities they were able to do helps them learn.












Help Build the Edgar Area Education Foundation

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Notes from the Nurse Fall 2021

Many parents ask, "When is my child sick enough to stay home from school?"

This is not always an easy question to answer. We hope that these tips can help!

A child who is sick will not be able to perform well in school and is likely to spread the illness to other children and staff. We suggest making a plan for childcare ahead of time so you will not be caught without a comforting place for your child to stay if he/she is ill.

We ask that you keep your child home from school if he/she has:

- Fever in the past 24 hours
- Vomiting in the past 24 hours
- Diarrhea in the past 24 hours
- Chills
- Severe sore throat
- Strep Throat (must have been taking an antibiotic for at least 24 hours before returning to school)
- Drainage from the ear(s) or eye(s)
- Bad cold, with a very runny nose or bad cough, especially if it has kept the child awake at night
- Head lice until your child has been treated according to the nurse or doctor's instructions

If your child becomes ill at school and the teacher or school nurse feels the child is too sick to benefit from school or is potentially contagious to other children, you will be called to come and take them home from school. We will be sending students home for the same symptoms listed above.

Specifically related to the potential for COVID, we will also send students home if they have **one** of these symptoms:

OR **two or more** of the following:

- Fever (Temperature of 100 or higher)
- New or worsening cough
- Shortness of breath/trouble breathing
- New loss of taste or smell

- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Unusual fatigue
- Runny nose/nasal congestion
- Headache
- Muscle/body aches
- Chills

Children may return to school when they are fever-free for 24 hours *without the use of fever-reducing medication*, have had no vomiting or diarrhea for 24 hours also *without the use of medications*, and other symptoms are *significantly improved*.

It is essential that the school office has a phone number where you can be contacted during the day and an emergency number in the event you cannot be reached. Please be sure that arrangements can be made to transport your child home from school and that childcare is available in case of illness. If your daytime or emergency phone number changes during the year, please notify the main office as soon as possible.

Please call the school health office at 715-352-3858 if you have any questions or concerns.

**Please note that if your child has symptoms of COVID-19, we would encourage you to contact your child's doctor to see if they recommend a test.






