

- 1. Go to the Edgar School District website and click on the PARENT TAB and then scroll down and click on the last link PARENT/TEACHER CONFERENCE REGISTRATION
- 2. Click on all teachers you wish to schedule a conference with and press SUBMIT
- 3. If you selected more than one teacher to schedule a conference with you will be prompted to answer a question:
 - Are the conferences for one student, more than one student or return me to the conference list to re-choose my conferences
- 4. You will then need to provide the following information:
 - Child's first name, child's last name, your name, your email address, phone number is optional and then press SUBMIT
- 5. You will then get this message:
 - Thank you for registering. Please check your email at the address you provided. You will find an email with the subject header "Select Date/Time for Teacher Conference Now". Just press the link in the email and you will be able to pick a time slot for the conference.
 - Note: Email sometimes does not get delivered immediately, please allow up to 15 minutes. You might also check your Spam folder.

2023 Wisconsin Act 20 (Act 20)

- ACT 20 is a law created to ensure each child attending a public school (including
 independent charter schools) is able to read proficiently by the end of 3rd grade.
- To achieve this goal, ACT 20 requires schools to provide high quality, science-based early literacy instruction and interventions and to monitor early literacy skill development for all students in grades 5K-3.
- ACT 20 includes the following requirements for early literacy curriculum, instruction and assessment:
 - Universal science-based early literacy instruction that includes phonological awareness, phonemic awareness, phonics, writing, vocabulary, oral language, background knowledge, fluency, and reading comprehension and does not include three-part-cueing.
 - Universal screening of early literacy skills for all students in grades 4K-3.
 - Diagnostic assessment of early literacy skills for students in 5K through grade 3 who perform below the 25th percentile on the early literacy screening.
 - Personal Reading Plan for students who score below the 25th percentil on the screener that includes intervention and weekly progress monitoring for students who perform the 25th percentile on teh early literacy screening.
 - Communication with parents and caregivers regarding early literacy curriculum, instruction, intervention, and assessment.
- ACT 20 applies to all students in 4K through grade 3, including students with IEPs.
- DPI has selected aimswebPlus by Pearson for early literacy screening in 4K through grade 3. At Edgar, we will use aimswebPlus to screen our students in reading and math in grades 4K-5 and FASTBridge will continue for students in grades 6-8.

Kindergarten News Mrs. Berg and Mrs. Cychosz

October is a month of field trips for us. We are so excited to go to the Mead Wildlife center! We will be starting a nature journal, learning about feathered friends, animal tracks and going on a nature hike.

In October we will be learning about fire safety. The highlight of our unit is always our visit to the Edgar Fire Station. The firefighters give us a tour of the station, and show us how to be safe in the event of a fire.

In math we are learning how to subitize- as we practice the numbers 0-5. Subitizing means you do not have to count each dot to know how many dots you have. Using your knowledge of numbers you can look at the dots and tell instantly how many you have.

We are also learning how to use a five frame to help us organize and think about numbers.

First Grade News! Mrs. Eberhardt, Mrs. Thorson, and Miss Neider

The first month of school has flown by! We are off to a great start! October will be another busy month. In math, we wrapped up Unit 1: adding, subtracting and using data. We will start unit 2: addition and subtraction story problems. We learned the difference between rules and laws in social studies. We will begin our first science unit, Light, Sound and Communication. We are looking forward to some fun hands-on activities! In reading, we have begun our WONDERS curriculum and our new HD BLAST for phonics. First grade is is doing fantastic with catching on to the new ELA routines. We are working on rhyming words, concept of print, genres and comparing stories. In writing, students have been learning about sentences, using capital letters and end marks.

Lastly, we are finishing up our fall testing and are excited to continue working on our math and reading skills! Please continue to read with your child for 15-20 minutes a day and practice those spelling words!



Second Grade News

We are off to a great start. Our second graders are enjoying our learning environment. It is so important to be using our literacy skills, so please encourage your child to read daily and turn in their reading log. We have been reading everyday at school and taking accelerated reader tests. Our students have also started writing in their journals and are practicing the paragraph format.



Adequate sleep is critical in early childhood. Brain foundations that last a lifetime are still being built in second grade. The brain does important work while children sleep, hence the need for so much rest. Please ensure your child goes to bed at an appropriate time to allow his/her brain to get the time it needs to work without environmental stimuli. The National Sleep Foundation recommends 10 to 11 hours of sleep a night for seven and eight-year-olds.

Ask your child about growth and fixed mindset. We have been studying this concept in order to begin the process of metacognition (thinking about learning). When we teach our children that they actually have control over growing their brains through the actions they take, it is empowering! We tell our learners that when they work hard by asking questions, practicing, and actively participating in their learning, they grow, make connections, and build their neurons. Learning from mistakes and applying effort is the most powerful way to become "smarter". Praise effort (you worked so hard) as opposed to comments about intelligence such as (you are so smart).

We just completed our Fall screener-AIMSWEBPlus. This evaluation helps to identify students' reading skills, such as phonemic awareness, decoding, and comprehension, allowing for targeted instruction tailored to individual needs. By using the data, the teachers can implement effective interventions that align with the science of reading principles, helping students build a strong foundation in literacy. Early identification and support not only enhance reading proficiency but will help to foster a lifelong love for learning, setting the stage for academic success.

What We Learned

Grade 4 News

The Fourth Grade Learners are well on their way to new discoveries as they ventured into their new 21st Century Learning Community. Fourth graders have learned how to log into their google accounts using their chromebooks and have connected to our Google Classroom pages. In Math we have learned about factors and multiples. We encourage all learners to practice basic multiplication math facts on a daily basis, for this will help them develop math fluency as they apply these skills in our daily math lessons. We will begin our next unit of study in Math which will focus on fractions. Together we will focus on developing a greater number sense as we discover how fractions, or parts of numbers are put together to make a whole.

In ELA, learners are reading expository texts and reading informational literature in class to understand how authors use writing skills and crafts to present information. Students are working together in small groups to develop greater reading skills. Our unit's theme has been taking a look at how Science can help predict Earth's Natural Disasters. We are also reading realistic fiction to discover how our actions can affect others. This has led our learners to discuss the topic of what we can learn about our Earth and how it is constantly changing, as well as learning about ourselves. We are preparing to write an argumentative essay by developing the ability to analyze informational sources to develop knowledge on a subject and how to use that information in our writing. Together we will build strong writing skills, as we learn about the writing process and begin our first formal writing piece in the form of an argumentative essay.

In Social Studies learners practiced thinking like a historian. We will be learning about our beautiful state of Wisconsin, as we explore all of its geographical features and the natural resources Wisconsin has to offer us. We are excited to have the opportunity to learn more about the business of agriculture through the "Food for America" program that our High School FFA members have become involved with. Our class will have the opportunity to visit the Borchardt Farm for a first hand experience of agriculture. We look forward to learning more about Wisconsin's agriculture.

Math

Language Arts

Students read the book *I Survived the Attacks of 9/11* and we just finished reading *Wonder*. We have spent a lot of time talking about the attacks, the heroes on that day, and the victims. IMPROVING READING FLUENCY

Wisconsin Act20 Law requires all students Gr 1-3 to be tested in the area of Reading Fluency (and Letter Sound Fluency for Grades 4K-K).



Fluency is defined as the ability to decode text with accuracy, automaticity and **prosidy** (the appropriate use of phrasing and expression to convey meaning).

Why Focus on Fluency?

With the ability to decode text quickly and efficiently, the reader can better recognize the words with automaticity, which allows the brain to focus on the content of the text.

Tips for Helping Your Child to Improve their Fluency:

- Be sure all letter sounds are automatic for your child
- Begin with reading smaller words accurately and quickly
- Chunk words or break apart larger words into smaller parts
- Read out loud to your child (model reading fluency)
- Repeat read (you read a sentence and have your child repeat what you are reading)
- Choral read (or read together at the same time as your child).
- Reread familiar text to build fluency
- Reread the same page or passage multiple times or days in a row
- Have your child read out loud every day.
- Use apps that read out loud to your child when you are unable to
