

### APRIL NEWS FROM MRS. WITT!

Edgar Families,

We just completed our annual PRESCHOOL SCREENING in mid-March. This is always a great opportunity to meet our new families and new future Wildcats! We enrolled 31 new Edgar Elementary Wildcats into four year old kindergarten for the 2025-2026 school year. Families were given the option to send their child 5 days a week or 3 days a week. Our new 4K Wildcats are very excited to start school in the fall.

April is a busy month for our spring testing 'season'. The FORWARD EXAM will run March 31-April 7 for students in grades 3-4-5. We will then do our spring AIMSWEBPLUS screener for reading and math in grades 4K-5th from April 7th-April 16. We are excited to see the growth that our students are making and can't wait to show you the results.

Quarter 3 ended on Friday, March 28, and quarter 4 began on Monday, March 31. Report cards will go home with students on Monday, April 7th. If you have any questions, please reach out to your child's teachers.

Please note that our APRIL Family Fun Night is our annual SCIENCE NIGHT on Tuesday, April 22nd in the HS Gym. More details to come home with students next week.

SUMMER SCHOOL sign up will be ready for all students next week! Please note the important details of summer school: summer school will run for five weeks with regular summer school running from June 16-July 17, Monday-Thursday from 8:00-12:00. Swimming will run June 9-July 3, Monday-Thursday from 8:00-10:00 and 10:00-12:00. There are no afternoon sessions. Breakfast and lunch will be served during summer school as well.

We kindly ask that you PLEASE call the elementary office (715-352-2727) or send a note with your child when your child will have a different end of day procedure; whether they are going home a different way, are staying after for an after school activity, etc. Safety is our #1 priority.

### READING WITH YOUR CHILD SUGGESTIONS:

DAILY READING PRACTICE

Set aside 10-15 minutes daily for reading aloud, choosing both familiar books and new ones to build fluency with both easy and challenging texts.

### ECHO READING

Read a short passage first and then have your child repeat after you, mimicking your expression and pacing.

### CHORAL READING


Read aloud together. This helps your child hear the correct pacing, expression, and fluency as you both read in unison.

### REPEATED READING

Have your child read the same passage several times to build confidence, speed, and accuracy. This can help them internalize the structure and rhythm of the language.


### PROVIDE FEEDBACK

Give gentle corrections and praise when your child reads with accuracy or expression. Focus on areas for improvement, such as smoothness or punctuation, while reinforcing their strengths.

We hope this message finds everyone doing well and anticipating spring! Now that we have officially marked the start of spring on our calendar, we are optimistic for spring-like weather! Wouldn't that be so wonderful?



As we head into April, we will be studying nature. We will discuss important science and social studies topics such as plants, seasons, weather, and taking care of our earth. Spring feels like the appropriate time for these special topics.

Most excitedly, we will complete our study of the alphabet with the letters Yy and Zz. We will then review and write all the letters throughout the remainder of the school year. We know all the letters! Yeah!

Important math concepts will be 3D shapes such as cones, spheres, cubes, and cylinders. We will continue to work on simple story problems, shapes, and patterns. We will practice printing our numbers. How quickly the school year has gone! We have just a very short time left in this school year!

Please note that 4K report cards will be sent home during the week of April 7, 2025. Report cards are a celebration of the many things each student is improving upon or mastering. Each child has many things to celebrate! We are so proud of every student! You may keep the reports. Please return the envelope. Thank you.

There will be no school in our district on Thursday, April 17th, and Friday, April 18th in observance of Easter. School will resume again after this short break on Monday, April 21st. We hope your family will enjoy some time together during this break.

### Kindergarten News Mrs. Berg and Mrs. Cychosz

This month in science we will explore storms and severe weather. We will obtain information from weather forecasts to prepare for storms and stay safe. We will also practice describing the various characteristics of weather (wind, clouds, temperature, and precipitation) in order to make our own predictions about storms.

In social studies we will learn where and why people live in certain places, and take a closer look at our Edgar community. We will create a rural, suburban, and urban community, using some very special building toys.

In math we will identify, describe, compare, and create three-dimensional shapes. We will also revisit counting, addition, and subtraction while working with familiar two-dimensional shapes.

In reading we are learning to accurately segment, spell and read words with 2 sound consonant blends.

In math, we have been measuring, comparing, and ordering by lengths. We will also solve addition and subtraction story problems with unknowns in all positions. In April we will be starting our geometry and time unit. Students will reason with shapes and their attributes, partition shapes into equal pieces, and tell time to the hour and half hour. Keep practicing those math skills!

In **reading** and **writing**, students will continue to learn about different genres. They will be learning how to find text evidence to support their thinking when responding to a text. Keep practicing those reading skills at home.

AIMSweb Screening will begin in mid-April.

In social studies, students are learning about community and economics, focusing on jobs, earning, saving, and spending money.

We hope you will have a "hoppy" Easter and enjoy the weekend.










# 3RD GRADE NEWSLETTER

### Fourth Grade April News by Mrs. Bemke, Miss Knoblock, and Mrs. Olmsted

As we enter the final quarter of the school year, our fourth graders are engaging in exciting new learning experiences across all subjects!

In ELA students read a story entitled, "A Drop of Water," by Walter Wick, an expository text that introduced them to the science concepts of water. Through this reading, students explored the different states of water and discovered how looking closely at things can reveal new insights. As part of this unit, students will have the opportunity to use the microscopes and magnifying glasses in our discovery barn outside the classroom to observe objects up close and deepen their understanding.

In Science, our young scientists have been exploring different types of energy. Students will be working collaboratively to create informational display boards and demonstrations showcasing what they have learned about energy. These projects will be featured at Science Night later this month, giving students an opportunity to share their discoveries with families and the school community.


In Math, we are continuing to focus on mastering basic multiplication and division facts, which will serve as a foundation for solving multi-digit multiplication and division problems coming up in our next unit. Students will explore different strategies to apply these skills in real-life situations, helping to strengthen their problem-solving abilities.

Fourth graders will also be participating in Junior Achievement this month, where they will be learning about regional resources and how those resources help influence entrepreneurship and business success. A special thank you to Mrs. Kirsch, who has volunteered her time to lead this valuable program.

In Social Studies, The fourth-grade learning community will begin to explore an exciting unit on government. Students will explore how "we the people" are an important part of government, explore the branches of government, learn how laws are made, and discuss what it means to be an active and responsible citizen. What a great start to spring in the 5th grade! The kids have been doing such a great job with all that we are working on! We have been reading a lot of good books during snack time and having great conversations about how to apply the lessons from the stories to our lives! Students have been engaged in our March Madness reading challenge. As a reward for our March Madness Challenge, we will watch the movie "Glory Road."

**Math:** We are working with decimals and all the operations. The kids did a great job with adding and subtracting decimals and remembering to line up the decimals. We will start to move into multiplying and dividing with decimals, which could be a little more challenging, as there are a few more steps to remember. They are doing a great job continuing to work with partners, on technology, and with our Math centers. Way to go!

**Science:** We were able to take our March pictures in the School Forest and hoping to spend time learning outside if we can get some warmer weather! We have been spending some time with our theme of engineering and aviation! We will begin our last plant lab (#3), mid-way through April. We will also be preparing for our Science Night displays and activities (Scientists, Aviators, and Labs). Science Night will be on Tuesday, April 22nd, 2025.

**ELA:** We have been working through our *Wonders* book, focusing on different skills with the story, grammar, and writing. We are enjoying all the different stories and genres, as the units fly by! The kids have done a great job with their vocabulary and comprehension of each of the stories! We will also read some novels to end the year! We hope each night the students can still find time to read for 20 minutes! The kids are always excited to be called up for the different AR point groups! We took 1st in the elementary last month! Fingers crossed we can do it again this month!

**Social Studies:** The students did an amazing job being responsible with video game-based skill work while learning about Westward Expansion. We played several online games that brought learning to life and allowed students to experience life as Americans in the mid-1800s. We also read an amazing book called, "Rachel's Journal" which described life on the trail from the perspective of a child. In our next unit, we will study the Civil War and the effects it had on those who lived in the Americas at the time.

\*\*Just to keep in mind, we will be sending home information about our "Math Day" Brewer trip. It will be in May (Wednesday, 21st), so look for more information to come! It is always a great way to extend our learning into a different atmosphere! Go Crew!

Does your child struggle with spelling words or mixing up letters when he/she is writing? Extra practice at home is important to help your child gain confidence in spelling. Here are some suggestions to help your child practice their spelling in a fun, game-based way:

- Let your child text you their spelling words or type them on a computer (turn spell-check off).
- Have your child make flashcards. Put the tricky letters in red or another color.
- Use alphabet magnets or scrabble tiles to spell a word.
- Make a sentence for each word or create a story using your spelling words.
- Write words in shaving cream, or on a plastic baggy of pudding, hair gel, etc.
- **Fingerpaint** your spelling words or write the words with a white crayon and then use watercolor paint to show the hidden words.
- Practice writing words using bath crayons in the bath.
- Write spelling words on sticky notes & place them around the house to read and spell.
- Play hangman with their spelling words.
- Play the headbands game. Write each spelling word on a notecard or piece of paper. Have your child hold the paper up by their head and have them guess the word that you spell out loud. Switch places and let your child be the speller while you guess the word.
- Use **pipe cleaners** to spell the words.
- **Sort words** into word families, beginning sound blends or digraphs, words with short or long vowels or vowel patterns, number of syllables, etc.
- Write your child's spelling words onto a small piece of paper. Cut the letters
  apart individually and mix up. Put each word in a plastic easter egg (or fun
  container). Have your child open the container and build the words.
- Play pass the paper. Say the spelling word to your child. Write the first letter
  on a piece of paper, then pass the paper to your child. Have your child write
  the second letter and continue passing the paper until the spelling word is
  complete.



### MUSIC NOTES from MRS. HAFFERMAN APRIL 2025



Thank you for supporting our art program! The students and I are so proud of the art they create! Late orders that are ordered by April 6th will be delivered to school.







### Measle Cases on the Rise

Did you know that Measles is so contagious that if 10 unvaccinated people were exposed to a positive case of measles, 9 of them would get virus? It is an airborne virus and it is THAT contagious.

According to the Cleveland Clinic, "Measles (rubeola) is a <u>viral</u> <u>disease</u> that causes fever and a rash. It's highly contagious and spreads through the air when a person with measles talks, coughs or sneezes. There isn't a medical treatment for measles — you have to let the virus run its course. The best protection against measles is to receive the <u>measles vaccine</u>."

A person is usually contagious about 4 days before the rash appears and about 4 days afterwards. The rash doesn't usually appear until a few days after other common symptoms appear. These include: fever, tiredness, cough, red or bloodshot eyes and a runny nose.
