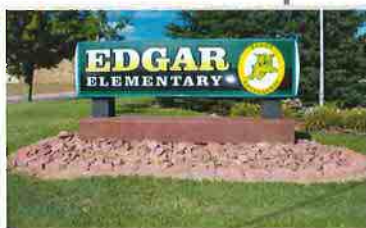

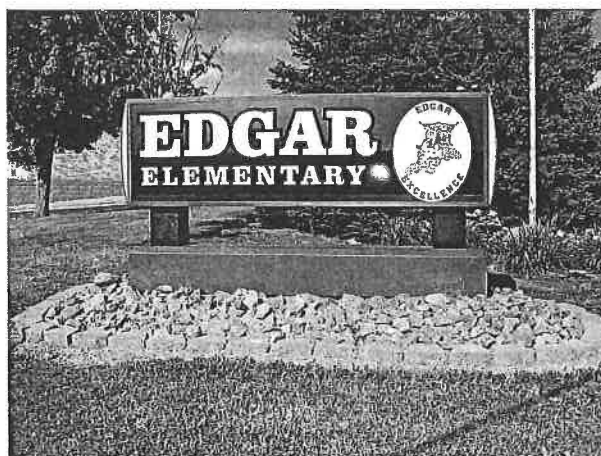

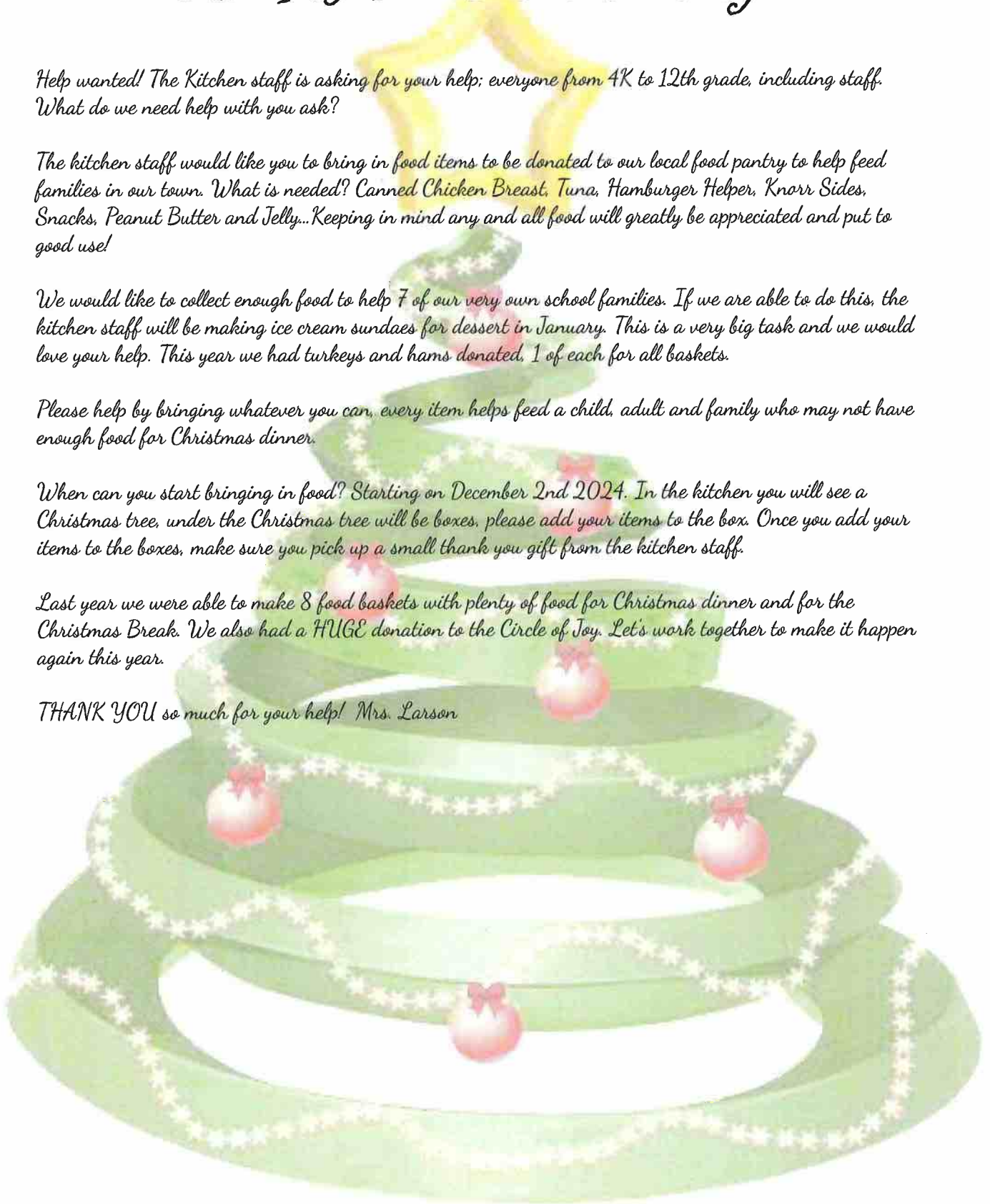

Second graders have been making nice progress in reading. The students are enjoying our reading program called HD Word. It is strong in phonics and follows best practices in the science of reading. It teaches the relationship between sounds and written letters, which plays a pivotal role in reading instruction. By understanding how letters correspond to specific sounds, learners can decode words more effectively. This foundation sets the stage for improved reading fluency and comprehension.



Math is another area where we have seen great progress. Students have been working well with their math partners to determine which operation to use in length story problems. We are so impressed with how well the students worked with story problems. Currently, the learners are using place value to represent numbers in different ways. We are also learning how to add and subtract 2-digit numbers.

Just a friendly reminder, we encourage you to have your child read daily, fill out the "Reading Log" sheet stapled in their planner, and return them to school. Your support from home is much appreciated and will provide your child with lifelong benefits. You make a positive difference in your child's education!

3rd Grade December News

What We Learned

We are starting unit 3 in Math. We will be covering addition, rounding, and subtraction within 1,000. We are going to be working on two-step word problems as well. Hopefully your child is practicing their multiplication and division facts at home each night. If you would like more resources or copies of the ones we sent home, please let us know! Again this should be done for 5-10 min. each night. There are digital resources on our third grade website in the symbaloo in the google classroom for math.

We are finishing unit 2 for ELA and students will continue to work on finding text evidence for different genres of text. Your child should keep reading 20 minutes each day, which includes fluency.

For Social Studies we finished our unit on government. The children did a mock vote on what book the class should read next. They also learned about the different branches of the government.

In Science we are starting our life cycle unit. Students will be learning about animal and plant life cycles, environmental changes, and pollination.

The fourth grade learners will be reading The Best Christmas Pageant Ever, by Barbara Robinson. Learners will develop the ability to come to discussions prepared, ready to demonstrate knowledge of information they have read about. Learners will make comments that contribute to the discussions and link it to the remarks of others. We are continuing to work on our writing skills, developing the ability to write fluently. We will focus on writing with complete sentences, varied in length and adding compound or complex sentences in our writings. As we go through the writing process, we will look closely at our choice of words and transitions, aiming to make our writings more interesting for the readers. Our young writers will be working on another Argumentative Essay. Students are learning how to read and analyze informational text to learn and build background knowledge to provide claim and evidence to support it.



In Math our focus will be to continue adding and subtracting fractions with like denominators. We will also begin to understand the relationship between fractions and decimals. Learners will continue to develop greater number sense through our daily number talks and sharing strategies in group discussions. Practicing the basic multiplication facts on a daily basis will help learners be successful in math.

In Social Studies learners are continuing to focus on the regions of Wisconsin and what land features make these regions unique. Students will culminate their study of Wisconsin Regions with a Choice Board project, showing what they have learned about the great state of they live in!



Fifth Grade News

What an awesome month in the 5th grade! Super proud of everyone! Great kids and a great learning atmosphere! Please be sure to review and sign the informational packet about the Wausau School Forest trip that is coming up! Feel free to contact us with any questions or concerns. We are hoping for more snow in the next couple of weeks! Fingers crossed!

Math: We have been working with Fractions and the kids have been doing a great job! We have been working on learning a variety of new centers within our curriculum. We will be working with multiplying fractions and two-digit by two-digit multiplication strategies before we go to the Wausau School Forest. Please continue to work on math facts at home, as it will help greatly with this unit! Thanks!

ELA: We have been moving along in our *Wonders* reading series! The kids have done a great job working with the vocabulary and skills for each story throughout the week! We are proud of their success! Next month we will have a "Hockey" themed reading challenge. Please continue to work at home with their reading fluency and AR books. The more they read, the better they will be for middle school and any higher levels of reading. We are excited to start "Snow Treasures", a new novel during our snack time! Notes from the Nurse

As I begin a leave of absence, I wanted to take a moment to share a few things with you. Mostly, I want to assure you that I am leaving the health office in good hands while I am away. Lisa Nowicki, BSN, RN is my replacement for the rest of the school year. Lisa has many years of nursing experience and has transitioned into school nursing easily. She has been learning her role alongside me since the beginning of the school year. If you need to reach her, you can call the health office or email her at lnowicki@mcse.k12.wi.us Lisa will be at school 1-2 days a week, and will be covering other schools the other days. Of course, Mandy Myszka, our longtime health aide will also be working in the health office over the school year; she is there Monday through Friday. I intend to return to my role for the 2025-26 school year.

The health office team has a few items we wanted to cover as we enter into the second quarter.

Emergency room/urgent care/walk-in/tele-doc/virtual visits

- If you are prescribed medications at one of these types of visits, tell them you need a school medication authorization form *signed by the provider and the child's guardian*. We are not able to give prescription medications without this, and often we are unable to track down the provider to sign one after the fact. Ask while you are at the hospital, clinic, or virtual appointment.
- Provider-signed medication authorizations can be dropped off at school, emailed to Lisa or Mandy, or faxed to the school at 715-352-3198.

Pneumonia and Pertussis (whooping cough)

- Both of these are contagious and can spread.
- Bacterial pneumonia (*Mycoplasma pneumoniae*) is active in the area this fall and will likely persist through the winter. This is also sometimes called “walking pneumonia” because not everyone is ill enough that they are down and out. It often requires treatment with an antibiotic. There is no vaccine for this illness. Info on symptoms and treatments can be found on the CDC website.

 - We have had several cases of pneumonia already this school year, some in each level- elem/middle/high school. If your child has an

ongoing cough or recurring fever, let their provider know that there have been cases of pneumonia at school.

- Whooping cough (Pertussis) is also on the rise in central Wisconsin. It can cause a severe cough that lasts for weeks to months, with ill people sometimes coughing to the point of vomiting or passing out. Antibiotics can help if started early enough. There is a vaccine to help prevent this illness. Info on symptoms and treatments can be found on the CDC website.

 - If a child tests positive for Pertussis, they will need to complete 5 days of antibiotic treatment before returning to school.

Sleep and the end of Daylight Savings Time

- Kids need enough sleep to be productive and successful at school. Kids have a multitude of reasons for not getting enough sleep, but right now, some will be struggling with the time change. Here are some steps you can take to help your child adjust.
 - Get bright light shortly after waking. Sunlight is best, but if that's not possible, bright artificial light can also help.
 - Try to get outside in the evening as the sun is setting. This can help the brain reset the circadian rhythm, leading to better sleep.
 - Keep light levels low in the evening. Use lamps instead of overhead lighting when possible. Avoid use of screens in the hours leading up to bed time. This supports natural melatonin production.
 - Finally, keep sleep and wake times similar (within 45-60 min) all week long, including weekends. Keeping routine sleep-wake schedule leads to a solid circadian rhythm.
