We ask all of our families to make it a priority to set aside 10 minutes every night for you to sit with your child and listen to them read. Starting in March we will be launching a READING INCENTIVE program with KWIK TRIP called KWIK BOOKS. READING WITH YOUR CHILD SUGGESTIONS:

DAILY READING PRACTICE

Set aside 10-15 minutes daily for reading aloud, choosing both familiar books and new ones to build fluency with both easy and challenging texts.

ECHO READING

Read a short passage first and then have your child repeat after you, mimicking your expression and pacing.

CHORAL READING


Read aloud together. This helps your child hear the correct pacing, expression, and fluency as you both read in unison.

REPEATED READING

Have your child read the same passage several times to build confidence, speed, and accuracy. This can help them internalize the structure and rhythm of the language.


PROVIDE FEEDBACK

Give gentle corrections and praise when your child reads with accuracy or expression. Focus on areas for improvement, such as smoothness or punctuation, while reinforcing their strengths.








CAKE RAFFLE

It is finally starting to feel like spring! We are hoping that this weather stays this way - we are sure loving the sunshine and fresh air!

In the upcoming month, our theme will be "Animals". Throughout the unit, we will discuss farm animals, wild animals, pets, and animals that fly. We will continue to learn important concepts in math. In March, our math focus will be simple addition and subtraction, as well as word problems and ordinal numbers. We will continue to learn throughout the day with learning centers, daily writing practice, and playing with our friends. Our focus letters for the month of March include Xx, Vv, Jj, and Qq. Phew, these are some tricky letters! But, we are ready!

We will celebrate Read Across America Week (Dr. Seuss Week) starting the week of March 3rd. This week will include daily themes and activities that will happen in your child's classroom throughout each day. March is also the month of 4K screening for our incoming 4K students. This means that there will be no school for current 4K students on March 14th, 2025. Our 4K teachers will be spending the day screening new students for next school year! This is an exciting time!

March Kindergarten News: Mrs. Berg and Mrs. Cychosz

We are going to the Grand Theater this month to see the musical "Don't Let the Pigeon Drive the Bus!" We can't wait!

We continue to grow our math skills. Previously, students have counted, composed, and decomposed numbers up to 10, using tools such as counters, connecting cubes, 5-frames, 10-frames, drawings, and their fingers. They wrote expressions to record compositions and decompositions.

In our new unit on numbers 11-20, students answer "how many" questions and count out groups within 20. They understand that numbers 11 to 19 are composed of ten ones and one, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, or nine ones. They write numbers within 20.

In reading we are working hard to spell and decode words with I blends, and digraphs!

We are eagerly awaiting the first day of spring on March 20, as we will be waking our classroom bears up from the long winter's nap.



1st Grade March News Mrs. Eberhardt, Mrs. Thorson, and Miss. Moore



In math, we continue to explore and learn about place value and what that means in math. We have been learning how to add and subtract multiples of 10, add a 1-digit number to a 2-digit number, and add two 2-digit numbers together. We also compare 2-digit numbers. In March, we will measure lengths and count to 120. We will also solve addition and subtraction word problems with unknowns in all positions.

In reading, we will be learning about main story events.

Our reading theme for Unit 4 is Animals Everywhere

We are continuing to practice sight words and reading fluently with expression.

We will be busy writing in response to our main texts each week. First graders are practicing adding more details to support their main ideas and topic sentences when writing. Students are building one writing piece throughout the week. They are given a topic on Monday and continue to add until they have written a 6-sentence paragraph by the end of the week.

We will be wrapping up Science at the beginning of the month. We are still learning about how different animals survive in the wild. We will be starting a new social studies unit this month. First graders will be exploring community and economics. We will be learning about earning money, as well as saving versus spending it, and discussing the difference between needs and wants.

MARCHIN' ALONG IN SECOND GRADE

The students will soon be enjoying Dr. Seuss Read Across America week. They are all looking forward to the dress-up day, reading

with 4K and 4th Grade, and the cake raffle on Friday.

We are in theme four in Language Arts. These stories are based around the essential question, "How does Earth change? The students will be working on writing with more details.

In math, we are on Unit 6, which is geometry, time, and money. The students are reasoning with



shapes and their attributes and partitioning shapes into equal shares. They are relating halves, fourths, and skip-counting by 5 to tell time. We will be using story problems involving the values of coins and dollars. This is an exciting unit. When you have a moment, ask your child what time it is and see if they can tell you if it is AM or PM. Give them some coins and practice counting their value. This will help them further their math foundation in time and money.

We have "Snow" much fun!











3RD GRADE NEWSLETTER





We are busy in third grade! In math we are multiplying larger numbers by a one digit number. (for example 24X5) Please ask your child to "teach" you what they are learning in class to help solidify their understanding. You can measure tables or carpets at home to find the perimeter along the outside of the carpet or table, and multiply the numbers together to get the area! Also, please continue to practice math facts at home! Even if your child has mastered them, it is important to keep our skills fresh. Please also keep reading at home each night!

We are on unit 4 for ELA and students will continue to work on finding text evidence for different genres of text. Your child should keep reading 20 minutes each day, which includes fluency.

In science we are learning about different weather patterns. Please ask your child what kinds of clouds are in the sky.

Notes

We saw so much progress with Winter AIMSWEB PLUS testing in both math and ELA!

Remember to keep having your child read the fluency passages we send home. It is important that they practice reading out loud! The goal is have them read at the same rate they talk.

Fourth Grade News

This month, our literature unit will focus on learning through expository texts. Students will learn that they can discover new things when they look at things closely. The story "A Drop of Water," by Walter Wick will ask students to think about water molecules and how they change. Our discussions will focus on the author's ability to present information about the different forms of water. Learners will be able to explain how photographs and captions contribute to the understanding of expository texts. Learners will also use their writing skills to summarize the information that they have read to build their understanding of the text.

In writing, learners will begin writing an expository essay. Students will read different sources to build their knowledge and use that information to write an informational essay on the positive impacts of technology. Learners are developing the ability to go through the writing process and learning strategies to meet their writing goals and grow as writers.


Learners are focusing on multiplicative comparison problems in math. We want to encourage the learners to keep practicing the basic math multiplication facts. In Math we will also focus on measurement problems, using standard units of measure, as well as the metric system. Learners will apply their multiplication skills in making measurement conversions.

Students will be focusing on energy and energy transfer in Science. Students will investigate how energy is stored, how it can make objects move, and how collisions transfer energy between objects. Students will also construct chain reaction machines to explore the many different ways that energy can be transferred. The learners will also be developing the ability to work in a group to prepare an informational display to share what they have learned about energy.









March Fifth Grade Newsletter

It has been a fabulous February in fifth grade! Many of you might have heard about band!! We are excited that Mr. Webb is going to find time to meet with the students to help them explore and get a taste for all the great things to come in middle school with band! More information will follow, as right now is just an opportunity for the kids to explore and gain interest!

Math: We have been moving right along in Math! We are into our third book (Units 5 and 6) and currently working with decimals. We are working with decimal numbers through the thousandths place value. The kids are doing a great job of comparing and rounding decimals. As always, please continue to help them with their homework and Math facts.

Science: We are working on our "green thumbs"! Yes, we are growing plants in February (along with some bugs!!!) and some are having success, while others not so much success! We are finished with our 2nd time at Plant Lab (the last is in May) and moving along with different labs and experiences! We have been working on engineering of boats and will move to aviation! Tons of fun to see what the students come up with! They took their phenology pictures for February last week in the School Forest! Always great to find time to explore the woods!

ELA: We are starting our 4th Unit which is about "storytelling"! It has been a great stretch in Reading with our stories inspiring our students to do some research and share information they have found with others! They have been working on their fluency each day through oral reading and AR reading challenges. We will be starting our March Madness Reading Challenge in class! We will give more information next week! Thanks for all your work with them at home throughout the week!

Social Studies: We are beginning a new unit dealing with the Lewis and Clark Expedition. Students have been researching, reading, and writing about their adventures across what we now call the United States. Students will learn more about the geography of our country by using some amazing tools like Google Earth and Google Voyager. Let's continue to discover more about moving westward and walk in the footsteps of past explorers!

WHAT CAN I/WE DO AT HOME?

The Simple View of Reading is a basic way to think about how to get our children reading. This multiplicative equation states:

Decoding x Language = Reading Comprehension

Decoding is a child's ability to understand the meaning of words and speech.

Language Comprehension

is a child's ability to understand the meaning of words and speech.

How can I help my child with decoding?

- -»Discuss letters from speech to print
 - Instead of saying the letter a says /a/, ask your child what letter represents the /a / sound, as in apple?
- →Segment words to build phonemic awareness:
 - Choose a word and say it aloud (ex. cat)
 - Talk about the meaning of the word (Grandma has a cat with soft fur.)
 - Tap the phonemes of the word (/k/-/a/-/t/)
 - Ask how many sounds does the word have (3)
 - Say the word together again (cat)

How can I help my child with language comprehension?

- Read books together that would be too difficult for your child to read alone.
 Discuss vocabulary words and their meaning.
- Use high-level vocabulary words in your daily interactions.
 - o Ex. Instead of saying "It's time to clean up your toys", say "It's time to tidy up."

Notes from the Nurse

We see a large number of students on a regular basis that come to the health office expecting over the counter medication for headaches and stomachaches when they have not tried alternate ways to resolve this first, especially early in the morning after just coming from home.

The health office staff are happy to help when issues are unable to be resolved, but it should not be the expectation that these medications are given on a routinely. We also will not give these medications 3 days in a row or more than 8 days a month without a provider reason and permission.

See the information below to help explain why children, especially those of younger age, should not be taking these medications on a regular basis.

Ibuprofen vs. Tylenol

How They Work

The exact mechanism by which acetaminophen (brand name of Tylenol) and ibuprofen (Advil, Motrin) relieve pain and reduce fever is not fully understood. Scientists believe chemicals in the body called prostaglandins play a role in transmitting pain, generating fever, and promoting inflammation. Acetaminophen and ibuprofen block these enzymes. While acetaminophen only works in the brain, ibuprofen works in the brain and the rest of the body. This means acetaminophen only helps reduce pain and fever, while ibuprofen has the added benefit of reducing inflammation and swelling at the site of an injury.

Risks and Benefits

The benefits of acetaminophen and ibuprofen are clear: less pain, lower fever and (in the case of ibuprofen) reduced inflammation. However, we must also consider the risks. Prolonged use of ibuprofen can result in decreased protection of the stomach from normal stomach acid. This may result in ulcers and bleeding. Ibuprofen can also damage the kidneys and cause **high blood pressure e**specially when large doses are taken over a prolonged period and taken on an empty stomach..

The biggest risk with acetaminophen is liver damage when very high doses are taken. This can lead to liver failure and death if prompt medical attention is not sought after an overdose.

When acetaminophen or ibuprofen are used to treat headaches over a long period of time, they may result in a rebound headache or (medication overuse headache). This is a headache caused by decreasing levels of acetaminophen or ibuprofen in the blood, which means you must keep taking these medicines to keep the headache away (not a good thing!). Over time, painkillers and other medications may lose their effectiveness.

Acetaminophen and ibuprofen are very safe when used at the *correct dose for brief* periods of time.

Ibuprofen should always be taken at the lowest dose for the shortest time possible. Taking ibuprofen long-term may cause side effects such as <u>stomach ulcers</u>, <u>hearing loss</u>, <u>headaches</u>, and bleeding, liver, kidney or heart problems. These problems can happen without warning signs.

 Do not give ibuprofen to your child if they have <u>asthma</u>, unless their doctor has said it's OK.

When to Call Your Doctor

7 Remedies for treating headaches:

- 1. Drink the entire bottle of water, juice or a sports drink.
- **2.** Rest in a quiet, dark room. Get enough sleep and follow a routine. Go to sleep and wake up at about the same time each day.
- 3. Offer a healthy snack—a piece of fruit, whole-wheat crackers or low-fat cheese. Not eating can make headaches worse. Eat meals at regular times. Do not skip meals.
- **4.** Get out of the heat. Apply a cool, damp cloth or wrapped ice pack to the forehead.
- **5.** Gently massage the neck and shoulders.
- **6.** Avoid screens such as TVs, tablets or cell phones. Always have the screen dimmed.
- 7. Consider over the counter medications like Tylenol or Motrin to treat the headaches. If your child has medication, give it to your child exactly as the doctor says. Don't give OTC pain medication more than two or three days a week. Daily use can trigger a medication overuse headache, a type of headache caused by overuse of pain medications. https://www.northshore.org/healthy-you/7-remedies-for-headaches-in-children/

Some children are sensitive to foods like chocolate, meats made with nitrates (hot dogs, lunch meats, pepperoni, and bacon), foods with monosodium glutamate (MSG), aged cheeses, fried foods, caffeine (coffee, tea, soft drinks with caffeine, and energy drinks). It may help to avoid these foods and see if the headaches go away.

Therapies

- Talk to a counselor. While stress doesn't appear to cause headaches, it can act as a trigger for headaches or make a headache worse. Depression also can play a role.
- Try deep breathing and/or other proven relaxation techniques and therapies
